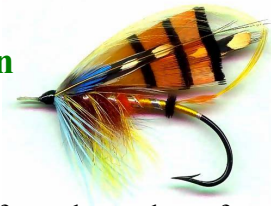

PPTU Mentor Program Beginners & Beyond

Ken Bowyer provides one-on-one streamside fly fishing instruction to PPTU members. Participants must show commitment by having waders or hip boots, a rod and reel outfit, and leader. Discussions will include equipment, knots, casting, flies, dry fly and nymphing techniques, entomology, reading water, conservation, etc. at nearby streams. Tackle and Tactics – Leaders - Bob O'Donnell

We all do it... stand mesmerized in front of the wall of colorful leader packs at the fly shop wondering what to buy. It can leave you numb if you're not sure what you need.

Most leaders are tapered monofilament nylon, meaning they are a larger diameter at the butt end, which attaches to the fly line, and smaller in diameter at the tip, where the tippet or fly is tied.

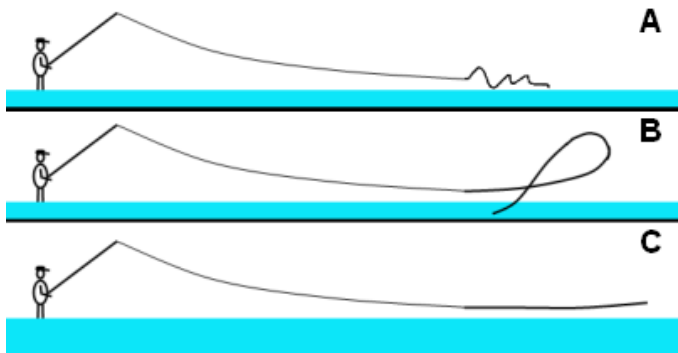
During the cast, the taper allows the leader to shoot through the air more efficiently, unroll, and rest softly on the surface of the water. Leaders come in different weights and strengths. The correct leader weight is primarily determined by the size of the fly.

Leaders come in various lengths and sizes to fit numerous fishing situations. The length of your leader mainly depends on the water conditions, not on the length of your fly rod. While it is easier to cast shorter leaders, especially in the wind, fish in shallow water are far more easily frightened by a fly line landing on top of them than a leader landing above them so use the longest leader you can comfortably cast.



For the beginner fly fisherman, a standard 9'5x leader is a good starting point. We'll talk tippet another day, for now what you're looking for is a leader that will turn over the fly you're using. Your leader should lay out

straight on a normal cast. (C) If you find it piling up or bouncing back, (A) its too short. If it doesn't unroll completely (B) its either too long or your fly is too heavy. To cure both, you simply add or subtract material length.



Leaders can be expensive, if you want to make your leaders last longer, you can add tippet to the leader as soon as it comes out of the package! That way, as you use up tippet by changing flies or cutting "wind knots," you are not shortening the leader until it's too thick at the end. So, if you want to fish a 9' 5x leader, for example, you can buy a 7½' 4x leader and add 18 inches of 5x tippet to it. When the tippet

starts getting short, you simply replace that part, leaving the leader intact.

General leader size guidelines:

- 6' Sinking fly lines of all types, panfish, bass, trout in tiny, brushy streams
- 7.5' Trout in streams from 10-20 feet wide, intermediate and sinking tip lines in lakes and saltwater conditions where the fish are not terribly spooky. Also streamer fishing for trout with big weighted flies.
- 9' Trout streams larger than 20 feet wide where the water is mostly riffled, or else the fish are not spooky. In salt water, fish in shallow water under bright, clear conditions.
- 12' Trout in lakes with floating lines. Trout in streams when the water is flat, low, or very clear
- 15' Spooky trout in extremely clear water in both lakes and rivers.

Next month we'll explore tippet material in detail, knots, and include some additional tips to make your fishing purchases last longer and work for you.

- Conservation projects that restore trout habitats in rivers & streams across Maryland.

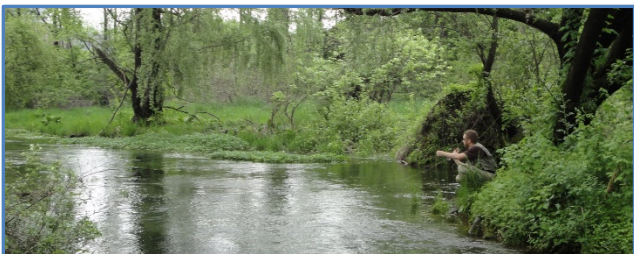
